

Board Resolutions - September 29, 2008



WHEREAS the Burrard Civic Marina has demand for boat moorage and the Marine Trades Association has indicated an interest in helping the Vancouver Park Board, create a new vision for the Marina;

WHEREAS the Vancouver Park Board would like to improve and expand its services at Burrard Civic Marina and look at both dry land storage, retail and food and beverage operations;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that staff contact the Marine Trades Association to investigate their interest and potential involvement in a re-development of Burrard Civic Marina and long term vision for marine boating operations;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that staff, in consultation with the Board, determines the best practices of other operators in North America for similar operations;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that staff report back to the Vancouver Park Board by March 1, 2009.



False Creek Fuel Barge

- At this location since 1938 Home Oil, then Imperial Oil (Esso)
- In 1991 Coast Guard station had major fire
- Esso given permission to place fuel tanks underground - safety and ease of delivery
- 2,000 resident craft in False Creek (800 are tenants of the Park Board) plus transient and commercial fleets
- Low volume business 1.5 million litres (Coal Harbour Chevron 50 million litres) per annum

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




Legal Agreements

- Park Board sublease of Provincial waterlot lease to Esso expiring in 2016. Rent is \$11,000 min/annum.
- Esso has Provincial waterlot lease for the fuel barge which is assignable, expires in 2016 but is renewable.
- Esso has right-of-ways through the Provincial waterlot for the fuel lines.







Burrard Bridge Civic Marina



<u>Transfer of Operator for the Fuel Barge</u> Actions to be taken before commencement

- 1. Esso must obtain environmental clearance on the groundwater, soils and soil vapor in the former underground tank nest.
- 2. Park Board can then release Esso from their sublease and sublet to the new operator who may then install their own tanks and pipeline to the barge.
- 3. Burrard Environmental Review Committee (BERC) has to approve the removal of the fuel pipes along the sea bed.
- 4. Esso has to finalize the sale of the fuel barge to the new operator who must then obtain assignment approval for the waterlot from the Province.

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
