FROM: General Manager - Vancouver Board of Parks and Recreation SUBJECT: 2017 Operating and Capital Budgets - Parks and Recreation

RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Vancouver Park Board approve:

- A. The 2017 Park Board Operating Budget of \$118,626,019 in expenditures and transfers, funded by \$57,108,517 in revenues and \$61,517,502 of tax-based operating funds, as outlined in this report;
- B. The 2017 Park Board Capital Budget in the amount of \$21,898,053, as outlined in this report; and
- C. Subject to approval of recommendations A and B above, the submission of the Park Board's 2017 Operating and Capital Budgets to Vancouver City Council for consideration in the approval of the City of Vancouver's 2017 Operating Budget and 2017 Capital Budget, as detailed in the Council report "2017 Capital and Operating Budget".

POLICY

The Vancouver Park Board's four year Capital Plan and its annual Capital and Operating Budget require Board and Council approval. Council approves the fiscal envelope for the Park Board's capital plan and its annual capital and operating budgets. Within this fiscal envelope, the Board approves the allocation to individual projects and programs.

BACKGROUND

In recent years the approval of capital and operating budgets have been aligned, recognizing the financial and operational linkage between the City's and Park Board's strategies and plans with the financial resources to enable those plans.

In September 2014, Council approved a 2015-2018 Capital Plan of \$1.085 billion. The City's 2017 Annual Capital Expenditure Budget is \$485.5 million, which includes \$21.9 million for Park Board specific projects and an additional \$19.2 million that for Park Board related projects that are managed by the City's Real Estate & Facilities Management group (REFM).

DISCUSSION

The Park Board operating and capital budgets are developed in parallel and put forward for approval at the same time, but the two budgets require different processes and context. The following sections provide a review of the different development processes and details of each budget.

Operating Budget

Many processes contribute to building the operating budget recommended for approval: the development of an annual service plan; a five year financial outlook; a budget outlook; a workshop with the Board on the proposed budgets; and public engagement on the budget.

To provide context for the proposed 2017 operating budget, a summary of Park Board key services delivered, major accomplishments for 2016, the high-level service plan for 2017, a look ahead for 2018-2021, and a five year history of service metrics are included in the City's 2017 Budget Book (on pages 182-201).

The four main goals that guided the development of the 2017 operating budget are:

- Continue providing valued services as efficiently as possible
- Ensure alignment with priorities of the Park Board
- Identify new sources of revenue to fund new initiatives
- Seek productivity improvements

Building the Operating Budget

The 2017 Operating Budget begins with the 2016 approved budget as a base. This base is adjusted by adding budgets for known or planned changes including:

- Revenue increases
- Fixed cost increases and adjustments
- Funding for new services or programs
- Funding for the operating impact of capital projects
- Productivity savings initiatives

The following table provides an overview of the above noted changes and is followed by more detailed explanations of each.

Revenue Increases

Revenue increases have been budgeted at \$2.6 million, with \$0.7 million budgeted for associated increased costs to generate that revenue.

Revenue increases can result from either expected increases to user fees or to expected increases in the number of customers. The 2017 budget changes reflect a combination of the two: planned increases to user fees are expected to generate \$1.3 million additional revenue, and an increase in customer volumes are expected to generate another \$1.3 million with additional associated costs of \$0.7 million. The anticipated change in the volume of customers is based on reviews of recent revenue trends, with the largest increases in golf, the Stanley Park train, and park concessions.

The increases for 2017 represent a significant adjustment over 2016 to capture experienced volume increases and user fee increases on average of 2.5%, an increase to account for forecasted inflation, as well as for select services to catch-up to market levels. For 2018 and beyond, it is expected that revenue budgets will see a much smaller increase compared to this year.

Fixed Cost Increases & Adjustments

The increase of \$2.8 million in fixed costs can be broken out into two main areas: \$0.6 million of this increase is for cost recoverable expenses, primarily community centre association (CCA) staffing costs and fees associated with incremental CCA revenues, while the remaining \$2.2 million increase includes funding for salary and wage increases and increased equipment and fleet costs.

New Services/Programs

New funding of \$0.6 million has been provided in two priority areas: \$0.4 million for increased public safety in parks via an investment in additional park rangers to provide improved service for major events and homelessness issues; and \$0.2 million for a safety and compliance framework as part of a risk management initiative to drive compliance accountability.

As part of these two noted priorities, six (6) new full-time equivalent (FTE) positions will be created:

The 2017 budget also carries over new funding of \$0.2 million provided in 2016 for increased washroom cleaning.

Operating Impact of Capital Projects

When new or renewed facilities, parks, or programs are added to Park Board service areas, there are often increased costs associated with the ongoing operation of the new facilities, parks, or programs. In 2017, the operating budget is increased by \$0.4 million: \$0.2 million for park maintenance to ensure service standards are achieved at new and renewed parks; \$0.1 million to support newly planted street trees; and \$0.1 million for direct costs associated with new services using ActiveNet (a point of sale system).

Productivity Initiatives

Throughout 2016, the Park Board, along with other city departments, continued reprioritizing resources and transforming operations to deliver on key priorities and service requirements. As part of the 2017 budget process, costs were adjusted and resources were reprioritized to focus on the highest-impact areas to best deliver on the 2017 service plan. As a result of diligent reviews, the proposed 2017 budget does not include a target for productivity initiatives.

Together, the above changes result in a 2017 gross operating budget of \$118.6 million, with \$57.1 million generated from fees, program revenues, and cost recoveries, and \$61.5 million in tax support. The table on the following page provides a detailed breakdown of the 2017 operating budget, outlining each major revenue and expense category.

The above budget schedule shows the year-over-year impact of changes by revenue type and service area expenditures. The 2016 budget shown has been restated to reflect interdepartmental reorganizations, changes in shared support services, and collective agreement wage settlements, making the 2016 and 2017 budgets comparable.

Capital Budget

The annual capital expenditure budget for 2017 is derived from the ten year Strategic Outlook (2011-2021) and the four year Capital Plan (2015-2018) approved in 2014. The four year plan identifies Park Board priorities for capital projects and planned funding sources for those investments.

The four main goals that guided the development of the 2017 capital budget are:

- Respond to the needs and pressures of a growing city
- Maintain, improve, and grow Park Board parks, amenities, and facilities
- Continue providing valued services as efficiently as possible
- Ensure alignment with Park Board priorities

Capital projects are considered on both an annual budget basis (annual capital expenditure budget) and a total project basis (multi-year project budget).

The 2017 Capital Budget includes expenditures for ongoing annual capital programs such as street tree planting and park renewals, upgrades and improvements to playgrounds and facilities, as well as significant one-time projects such as the construction of a new downtown park at Smithe and Richards.

The \$17.3 million in new Park Board multi-year project requests and their funding sources are summarized in Appendix A. A portion of the costs associated with these projects will be incurred in 2017 and have been included as part of the Park Board 2017 Annual Capital Budget, which is summarized in Appendix B.

The \$21.9 million in Park Board projects that form the 2017 Annual Capital Budget and for which approval is sought are summarized in Appendix B. The 2017 Annual Capital Budget includes \$9.8 million of expected costs to be incurred in 2017 for new multi-year project requests, as well as \$12.1 million of costs to be incurred in 2017 relating to multi-year projects which were requested and approved in previous years. These projects are subject to many processes that may impact project scope and delivery timelines: First Nations and public consultation; development and building permits; and scope changes resulting from procurement or funding source issues, or from project specific issues that may emerge during project planning or construction.

Following are some of the notable Park Board managed capital projects:

- Construction of a new park in the downtown core at the intersection of Smithe and Richards streets is scheduled to begin in late 2017. The new park will serve as a place for community recreation, culture, and tranquility, while improving the livability of the area, augmenting green space, and contributing to the Greenest City Action Plan goal of increasing access to nature.
- Community engagement about four new parks in East Fraserlands is ongoing in 2017. The new parks occupy a total of 7.8 acres and will be designed to provide greenspace, connectivity to the Fraser River, and habitat for local birds and wildlife.
- The comprehensive Parks and Recreation Services Master Plan initiates in 2017. This plan will chart the course for park, facility, and program delivery for existing and future residents, and is the largest plan the Park Board has undertaken since 1992.

- For field sports, determining locations for a new track and field training facility, a new synthetic turf field, and sport field upgrades are slated for 2017 so that construction can occur subsequently.
- A number of other new amenities are proposed across the park system, such as on-course
 washrooms at Fraserview and McCleery Golf courses, new skateboard and bicycle
 features, designing a new recreation space for Coopers Park, and new and renewed
 tennis and basketball courts.
- Planning for a new outdoor pool will be completed in 2017 with a conceptual design and community engagement. The location of the pool will be determined in 2017 after the Park Board's VanSplash (citywide aquatics) study is completed and adopted by the Park Board.
- Renewing parks and playgrounds is also ongoing. Construction of improvements at Sunset Park begins in 2017, and planning for new amenities at Renfrew Ravine and Renfrew Community and Brewers Parks continues. The pond at the Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Garden and park will be renovated, and playground replacements at Douglas, China Creek North, Charleson, Collingwood, and John Hendry Parks are scheduled along with smaller scale upgrades at many other playground locations.
- The Park Board continues to support Urban Forestry and plans to increase the urban forest canopy through tree-planting programs in parks, on streets, and through private property partnership programs. This work builds on the Greenest City 2020 Action Plan's Access to Nature goal of planting 150,000 new trees by 2020.
- In the priority area of biodiversity, a new salt marsh at New Brighton Park will open in 2017 (delivered in collaboration with the Vancouver Port Authority). Ongoing work on the restoration of Beaver Lake in Stanley Park and community engagement about the restoration of a lost stream in Tatlow Park are anticipated in 2017.
- Renewal of portions of the Stanley Park Seawall is a priority in 2017, and this project is the recipient of a federal infrastructure grant. The work includes repairs to the existing seawall, rebuilding two sections damaged by recent storms (on English Bay and near Siwash Rock), and habitat enhancements.

Taken altogether, the 2017 Capital Budget detailed above provides \$21.9 million in funding for a diverse range of projects to deliver on enhancements to core parks and recreation services and provide for future growth.

Also, Appendix B includes information on projects related to the Park Board but managed by the City's Real Estate & Facility Management group (REFM). Following are some of the more notable park related REFM capital projects:

- The Killarney Seniors Centre project involves the design and construction of a new seniors' centre, which will be an important addition to the existing Killarney Community Centre footprint. Development and building permits are being finalized and construction is anticipated to start in early 2017, with completion in 2018.
- The Britannia Community Centre redevelopment will span 10 years, with the planning work that was initiated in 2015 continuing as partnership agreements move forward.

Current and proposed co-location of the community centre, ice rink, swimming pool, family place, library, and elementary and secondary schools will provide services and amenities for the Grandview-Woodland, Downtown Eastside, Strathcona, and Hastings-Sunrise communities. The master plan and vision phase will be completed by fall 2017, and will inform the phasing of the renewal process.

- Planning for the renewal of the Marpole-Oakridge Community Centre is a top priority, with community consultation to be completed in early 2017, which will contribute to the design, with the full renewal project expecting to take place over a number of years beginning in Q4 of 2018.
- Plans for Burrard Marina include upgrades to some of the marina's main floating docks as well as some upland electrical and water services, with most construction to be complete by the end of 2017.

A complete list of all capital projects for 2017 is included in Appendix B of this report, and also in <u>Appendix B of the Council report titled "2017 Capital and Operating Budget"</u>.

SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to present the Operating Budget final estimates of revenue and expenditures for 2017 to the Park Board for approval, and to request Board approval of the 2017 Capital Budget, which includes new capital programs/projects and associated funding requests, and 2017 capital expenditures for continuing (carry forward) programs/projects.

The proposed 2017 Park Board Operating Budget includes total expenditures of \$118.6 million, an increase of \$4.4 million or 3.9% of the 2016 approved budget. This expenditure budget increase is to be funded through a \$3.2 million increase in revenues and \$1.2 million funded from tax-based support.

The 2017 Operating Budget is a balanced budget that takes into consideration the forecast of the 2016 annual results as well as the cost of new programs and services and increased fixed expenses.

The 2017 Annual Capital Budget consists of \$21.9 million in costs to be incurred in 2017. This includes a portion of costs from new multi-year projects, which commence in 2017, as well as continuing projects from 2016 and prior.

Both Operating and Capital budgets are focused to support the strategic directions, goals, and objectives of the Board's 2015-2018 Strategic Plan.
