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Background


- Proposal received from the Portuguese Joe Memorial Society for monument to Portuguese Joe Silvey and Coast Salish wives, Khaltinaht and Kwatleematt.
- Sculpture to highlight ancestral connection of Coast Salish and Portuguese communities in Vancouver
- Proposed location at Brockton Point, Stanley Park
- Standard Park Board donation process being followed

Portuguese Joe Silvey

- One of the early Europeans who settled in Vancouver
- Came to BC coast in 1860 on a whaling schooner, jumped ship to try gold-mining
- "Renaissance man" of generation
- Married first wife Khaltinaht, Chief Kiapilano's grand-daughter and moved to area now called Brockton Point where other European and First Nations families lived
