Park Board General Manager Retirement




- Malcolm started his career at the Park Board in 2010.




Development of several progressive Board approved strategies, including:

- Park Board Concession Strategy (2019);









Malcolm was a driving force in the process of implementing Reconciliation throughout the organization and enabling staff the space to undertake the ongoing Reconciliation work:

- Establishing a Stanley Park Intergovernmental Committee, working with the Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh;
- Park Board adopted eleven reconciliation strategies (2016);
- The <u>Reconciliation Mission, Vision, and Values</u> (2018) was adopted as a foundation for Reconciliation within the organization;
- The Park Board has committed to undertake a comprehensive <u>Colonial Audit</u> in order to identify opportunities (short & long term) and specific ways to improve policies and practices with regard to Reconciliation;
- Hiring of first Reconciliation Planner and Archeologist.

A Report on <u>Quarterly Capital Budget Adjustments and Closeouts</u> - the report notes a request for Council approval of an increase of \$6.4 million to Multi-Year Capital Projects Budgets (funded from the 2019-2022 Capital Plan and budget reallocations). Expenditures in 2020 relating to the increases to Multi-Year Capital Project Budgets will be managed within the current overall 2020 Annual Capital Expenditure Budget of \$701.8 million.
