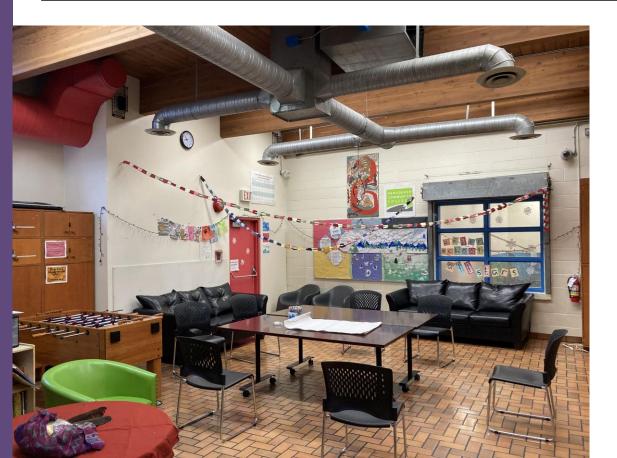

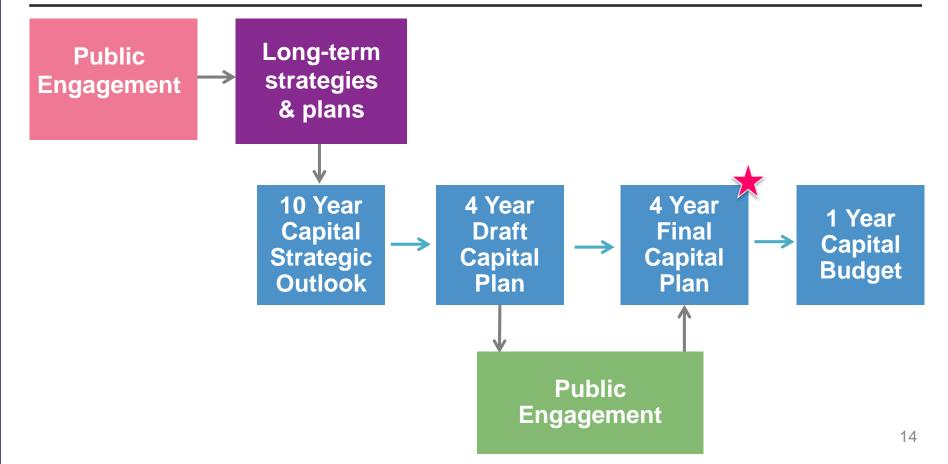

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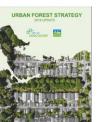
BOARD OF PARKS AND RECREATION

External Impacts

- Climate change pressures

- Cost escalation
- Rising inequity in services citywide

- Prioritization of reconciliation and decolonization
- Population growth & Resilient assets and amenities in densifying areas
- Infrastructure deficit
- Accessible facilities and spaces
- Demand for nature in the city

2. 4 Year Capital Plan by Service Area

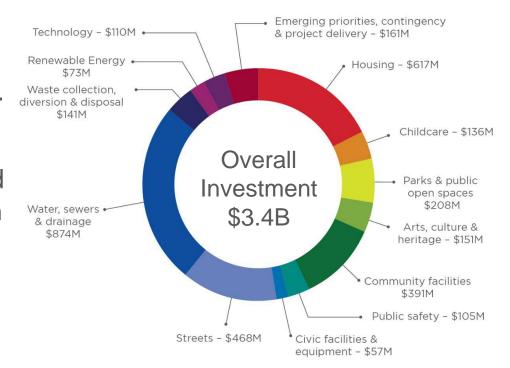








- The draft 2023-2026 Capital Plan directs ~\$3.5 billion of investments over next 4 years.
- \$539 million or roughly 15%
 of this amount is contemplated
 for investment in parks & open
 spaces, recreation facilities,
 and service yards.







The Park Board plays a key role in the development of 3 service categories (Parks & Open Spaces, Community Facilities, and Civic Facilities). These service categories are then broken further into sub-categories:

Parks and Open Spaces

- Park Land Acquisition
- Seawall and Waterfront
- Decolonization, Arts & Culture
- Urban Forest and Natural Areas
- Park Amenities
- Buildings, Infrastructure and Vehicles

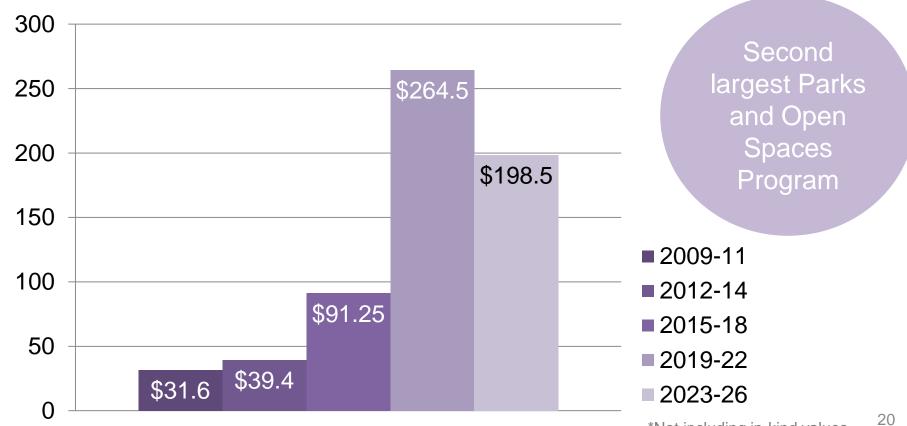

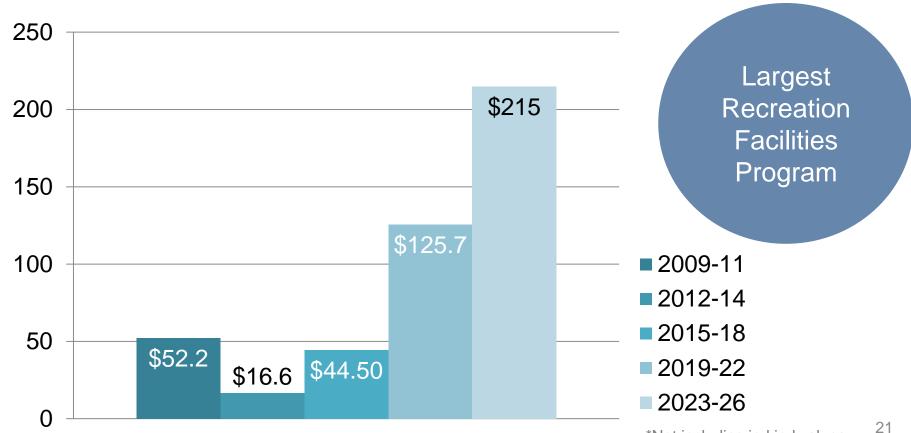

2. 4 Year Capital Plan – Parks and Open Spaces over time

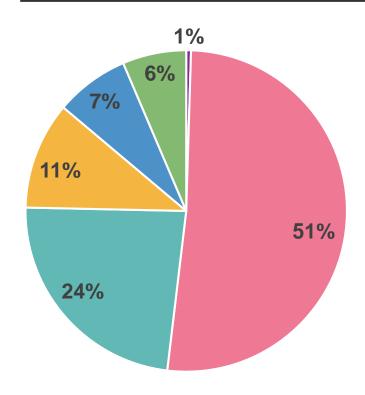


2. 4 Year Capital Plan – Recreation Facilities over time







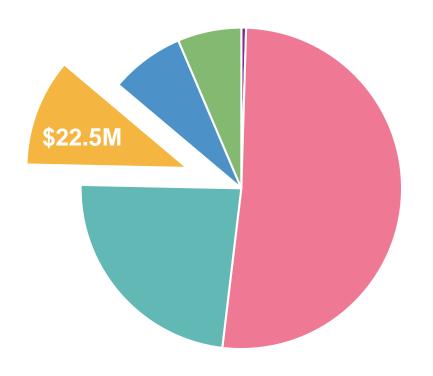


Parks and Open Spaces Total: \$208.M

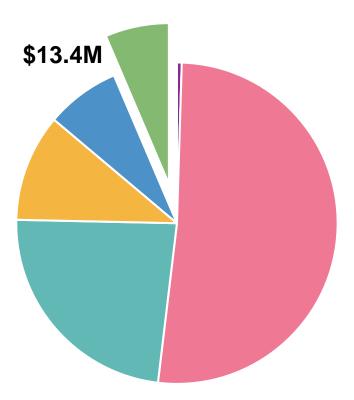

2. Capital Plan by Service Area - Urban Forest & Natural Areas



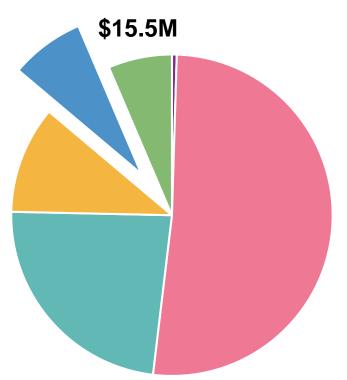
Invest in park and street trees, green infrastructure, biodiversity, management of natural areas and environmental stewardship.

Projects in Stanley Park, English Bay, False Creek seawalls, shoreline, beaches, and marine structures

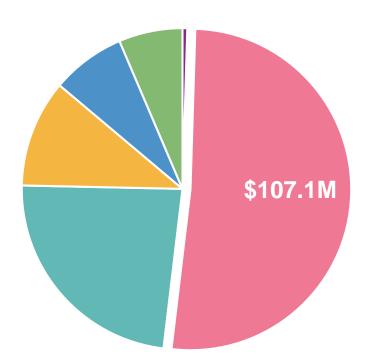

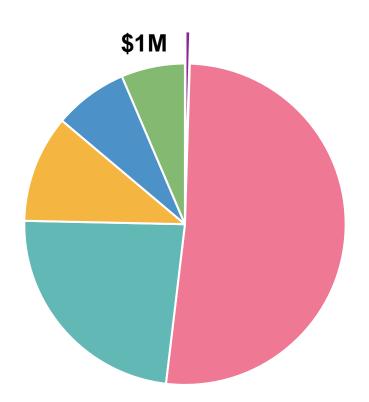

2. Capital Plan by Service Area - Decolonization, Arts and Culture





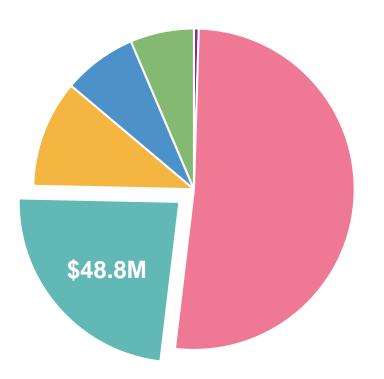
Capital projects support ongoing efforts to decolonize the Park Board, work effectively with First Nation partners and bring more cultural visibility to the land.

Washrooms, roads, parking lots, benches, signs, lights, vehicles, equipment water and electrical infrastructure.

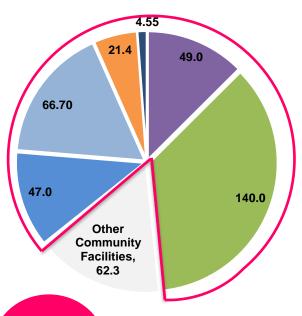
- Park vehicles, equipment renewal and electrification

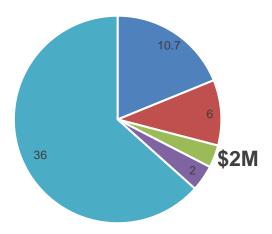

2. Capital Plan by Service Area - Service Yards

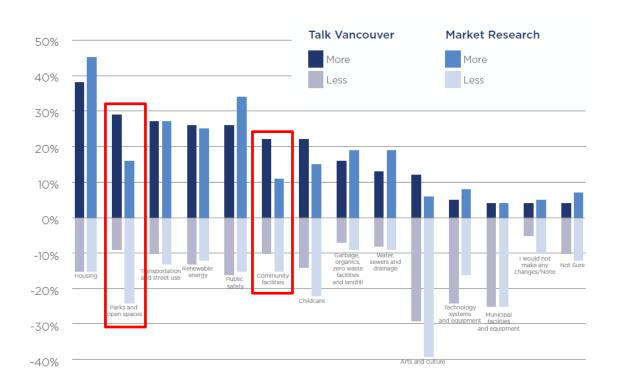

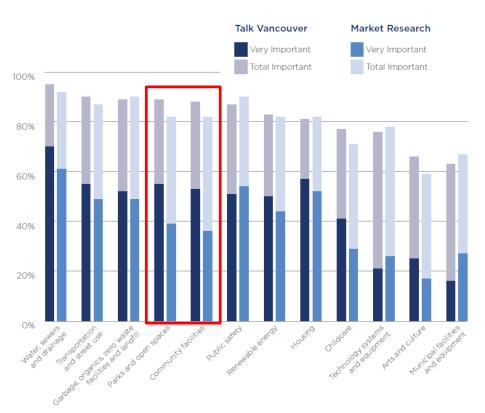

Q: Thinking about the City as a whole, how important do you think the following categories are to the larger community?







- Community Facilities Key Themes
 - Prioritize aging community facilities in need of maintenance and upgrades over new facilities
 - Comments about public pools
 - unevenly distributed throughout the city, insufficient amount
 - support and opposition for construction of an outdoor pool in Mount Pleasant Park

3. Public Engagement – COV Online meetings and Pop Ups



- Parks and Open Spaces Key Themes
 - Support for more public washrooms in parks.
 - Interest in conserving, upgrading and creating new green spaces, particularly on the city's east side.
 - Concern about the sale of school lands and interest in maintaining them as public green spaces.
 - Calls for investment in more outdoor recreation infrastructure.
 - Desire for more accessible playgrounds.
 - Support for green spaces to respond to climate change and housing development.

3. Public Engagement – Highlights

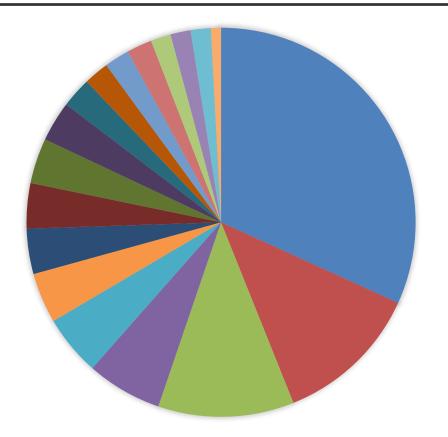

- More green, reallocate street right of way, expand tree canopy, increase native plantings for ecosystem diversity, bird and pollinator habitat
- Increase washrooms and their quality







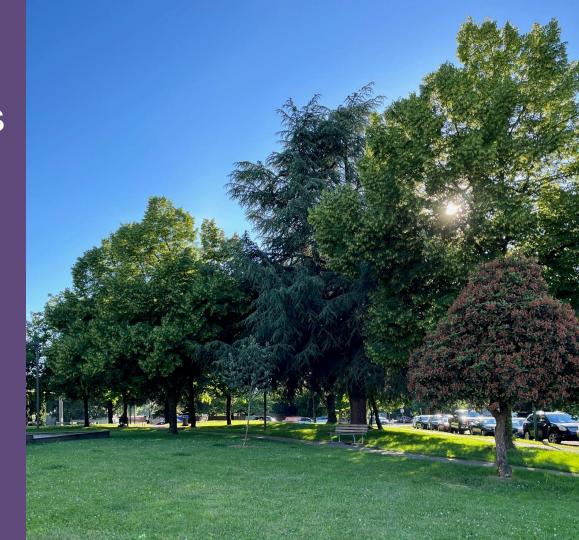

3. Public Engagement – Input Reflected in Capital Plan

- 14% of requests relate to studies or strategies in 2023-2026 (e.g., sport court strategy)
- 11% of requests for specific projects are included in the 2023-2026
 Capital Plan
- 30% of requests are included, with siting to be determined.
- 32% of requests will be considered in future capital plans (pools).
- 12% of requests are for non-capital projects, non-parks projects, or are ideas for consideration by City departments.

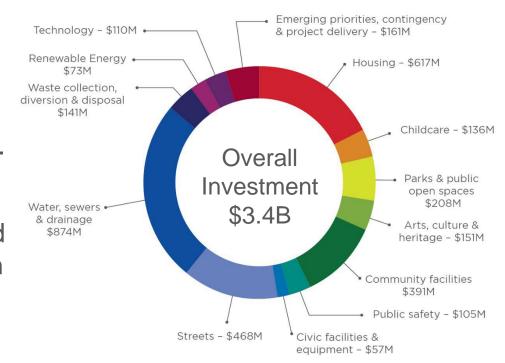

Draft 2023-2026 Capital Plan

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- \$539 million or roughly 15%
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4. Recommendation



- A. THAT the Vancouver Park Board support the final 2023-2026 Capital Plan, specifically the service delivery areas of the Park Board as outlined in this report, totaling \$539M:
 - \$208M Parks and Open Spaces;
 - ii. \$329M Recreation Facilities; and
 - iii. \$2M Service Yards
- B. FURTHER THAT the Board direct staff to work with City of Vancouver staff to develop a focused funding and delivery strategy to address the infrastructure deficit for critical park infrastructure. This work would include in-ground infrastructure, soft and hard surfaces, park buildings and upgrades that serve both the existing population and growth, to facilitate strategic funding and delivery of this work in the 2027-2030 Capital Plan.

4. Recommendation – FINAL as Amended



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 - \$208M Parks and Open Spaces;
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 - iii. \$2M Service Yards
- B. FURTHER THAT the Board direct staff to work with City of Vancouver staff to develop a focused funding and delivery strategy to address the infrastructure deficit for critical park infrastructure. This work would include in-ground infrastructure, soft and hard surfaces, park buildings and upgrades that serve both the existing population and growth, to facilitate strategic funding and delivery of this work in the 2027-2030 Capital Plan.





- C. THAT, pending approval of the Sport Field Strategy currently in development, the Park Board request Council add \$7.7M through emerging priorities funding, and a portion of new DCL funding that may become available at the time of the 2023-2026 mid-term update, to be directed towards new, renewed, and expanded outdoor sport field facilities in parks to support these critical assets for the promotion of mental and physical health of Vancouver residents and visitors, primarily youth and children.
- D. THAT the Vancouver Park Board direct staff to explore reallocating \$11.5 million of funds in the proposed 2023-2026 Capital Plan to facilitate the planning, design and building of the Mount Pleasant Pool: \$5.5 million from converting parkland to healthy habitat; and \$6 million from other sources of funding to be determined by staff.
- E. THAT the Park Board request Council for additional funding to complete the outdoor pool phase of the Marpole Community Centre renewal plan.
