What is safety in sport?

PHYSICAL

- Injury prevention and management
- Equipment
- Environmental safety

PSYCHOLOGICAL

- Emotional, cultural, spiritual
- "The belief that one will not be punished or humiliated for speaking up with ideas, questions, concerns or mistakes" (Edmondson, 1999)

If these are absent, there may be maltreatment

Why does safety in sport matter?

All the benefits of sport only come when it's safe

Benefits of safe sport

- Belonging
- Physical health throughout the lifespan
- Mental health throughout the lifespan
- Performance
- Opportunities for inclusion
- Strong communities

Consequence s of unsafe sport

- Fear of joining sport
- Dropping out of sport
- Emotional and physical harm
- Difficulty finding officials
- Loss of confidence
- Loss of career
- · Consequences can be invisible

Safety in sport is a human right

UN UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

Article 1

All human beings are born free and **equal in dignity and rights.**

Article 3

Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

Article 5

No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.

International Context

Safety in Sport has become a focus internationally

IOC Consensus Statement on harassment and abuse (non-accidental violence) in sport (<u>link</u>)

Many nations setting up national mechanisms to handle complaints in sport independently from sports organization (i.e. New Zealand, Australia, UK, USA)

Academic research helping to understand the issue and what can be done





Prevalence of Interpersonal Violence (IV) against Children in Sport





Role of **Perpetrators**





Prevalence of IV and level of sport participation





Location of experience







Evidence-based strategy

PREVENT

REPORT

The most common response to maltreatment is silence.

REPORT RESPOND UPHOLD

Organizational tolerance of maltreatment is the key risk factor

Safe Sport Requirements in Park Board/COV Policies



- At the Federal and Provincial levels, Safe Sport Policy/ Commitment/Training/etc. is a funding requirement/condition
- At the Municipal level we can control who can/cannot get to permit our sport facilities – clarify how in our new Affiliation and Allocation Policies
- Sport Hosting Grants from Sport Tourism

Affiliation Policy





What is an Affiliation Policy?



An **Affiliation Policy**

- ...precedes an allocation strategy as it clarifies who is entitled to priority access to facilities and associated privileges.
- ...reflects Park Board priorities and in particular its commitment to safety, diversity, inclusion, equity and reconciliation.
- outlines the terms and conditions by which a sport group qualifies for an affiliation status and it identifies the privileges it earns, such as discounted fees and preferred access to permitted sport facilities.

Potential Benefits of Affiliation to the Sport Groups



- Priority Access to Sport Facilities
- Rental and Lease Rate Subsidies field of play, meeting rooms
- General Promotion and Publicity Opportunities
- Organization Support and Development Services
- Access to storage, concession and related spaces
- Sport Tourism grants
- Membership in Sport Councils, e.g. VFSF

Affiliation Criteria – Base Obligations



- Vancouver Based
- Governance

Non Profit Status

- Insurance, Good Standing
- Volunteer Executive
 - Sanctioned & Governed



Affiliation Criteria – Innovative Obligations



- Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Expectations or Requirements
- Safe Sport Expectations or Requirements
- Introduction of a Play it Forward Program
- Climate action



Affiliation Policy Implications



- Restructure **User Fees** to introduce new affiliation nomenclature, non-resident and for-profit fees
- New permit office resourcing to administer the affiliation and allocation policies



Facility Allocation and Management Policies





What is a Facility Allocation and Management Policy?



An Allocation Policy

- ...is a comprehensive, transparent, contemporary, fair and equitable guide, which embodies Park Board and Sport for Life guiding principles with a goal to optimize facility utilization.
- ...provides expectations and frameworks for seasonal and tournament management, for conflict and dispute resolution and for fiscally responsible facility operations and administration.
- ...provides clarity and ensures adherence to the obligations and commitments necessary from both the Park Board and its user groups/permit holders.

Why Is it Necessary?



- Van Play Recommendations (4)
- Track and Field Strategy Recommendation (1)
- Sport Field Strategy Recommendation



What are the Benefits?



- Provides optimal practice and game time for each sport based on their registration numbers applied to a mutually agreed upon standard of play
- Optimizes facility use
- Facilitates access to sport spaces for new and emerging sports so they can establish and grow their programs
- Clarifies how special event, regular play and unstructured use are balanced and prioritized
- And many more ...
