



Calls for Service Trends

Calls for service have levelled or decreased at English Bay and Kitsilano Beach in line with city-wide trends.





English Bay Beach & Kitsilano Beach



Violent Offences Trends

Violent offences have increased citywide, with a more substantial increase at English Bay and Kitsilano Beach.









3-1-1 Feedback Logs



- Over 2,000 complaint logs analyzed for English Bay and 3rd Beach over the last 5 years
- Complaints have increased 4-fold since 2018, likely a reflection of increased park use
- Majority of complaints for English Bay / noise-related to buskers (75%)
- Use of the word "drinking" has increased in complaints from 2021 up until 2023

Annual number of 311 Logs for English Bay & Third Beach








Waste Monitoring


- On average, waste totes were 40% full, and Kits Beach had highest level of litter on beach, with lowest tote fullness
- Broken glass was also highest at Kits
 Beach (and western beaches in general)
 compared to downtown beaches
- Education and enforcement needed to ensure litter makes it to totes

Overall beach surface litter levels by park beach






Staff Impacts

- About 55 staff surveyed
- Over 60% of staff had significant or considerable impacts
- Lifeguards & Park Rangers most impacted
- Top 3 issues cited were:
 - 1) Dealing with Public Outrage or Disrespect,
 - 2) Not enough bodies in a particular shift, and
 - 3) Increase to staff physical safety

Opinion Poll


- 2,000 residents polled (1,000 in Metro Vancouver, and 1,000 in Vancouver)
- 64% heard of the pilot program (while only 24% of respondents participated)
- At least 70% support alcohol on beaches

Should drinking be allowed, and which beaches?





2024 Implementation Framework









Public Safety



- Exclude English Bay, Sunset Beach, 3rd Beach, Crab Park and Fraser River parks, due to enforcement issues
- Increase VPD and Rangers presence
- By-Law updates for improved ranger enforcement of drinking outside of permitted areas, glass bottle use, litter, and loud music
- Collect further data from VPD calls for service and violent offenses (relationship between data and alcohol consumption)
- De-escalation training for lifeguards



Waste Management



- City's Engineering Sanitation team to review number and location of waste bins
- Review Recycling number of stations and locations
- Communications plan to encourage appropriate disposal of waste
- Continue paper picker data collection in 2024



Communications



- Focus on education:
 - Consuming alcohol safely
 - Being respectful of neighbours
 - Disposing of litter
- Rigorous communications program including:
 - Media Release/Conference
 - Television
 - o Radio
 - Social media
 - Print
 - New and better signage



Events & Concessions





Special Events:

- Special events procedure updated to accommodate alcohol on beaches
- Special events at Kits Beach requires additional support

Concessions:

- Alcohol sales at concessions being considered for 2025
- Alcohol sales at concessions endorsed
 - Aligns with Alcohol on Beaches
 - Sales may offset costs for additional resources



Timeline & Next Steps



Next Steps

- Pending Board decision, staff to report to Council Meeting on May 7th, 2024 to seek funding
- Complete planning for implementation of Alcohol launched June 1, 2024







Summary

- More resources are needed if pilot is to continue
- More data collection required to determine alcohol related issues
- After pilot, post-pilot analysis to confirm success:
 - Confirm additional resources reduces challenges at key locations
 - Confirm effectiveness of implementation plan





Recommendations



- A. THAT the Board approve the proposed implementation of the Alcohol on Beaches Repilot for the summer of 2024 on Jericho Beach, John Hendry Beach, Kitsilano Beach, Locarno Beach, New Brighton, Spanish Banks, and Stanley Park Second Beach contingent upon incremental operating budget funding being allocated by Council to support the successful implementation as outlined in this report.
- B. THAT if the Board approves A, that the Board, in keeping with the Auditor General's recommendation #1, direct staff to provide a report to Council on the Alcohol on Beaches pilot and request the funding necessary to implement the re-pilot.
- C. THAT the Board approve the updates proposed to the Parks Control By-Law to update the pilot launch dates for permitting Alcohol Consumption on beaches from June 1, 2024, to September 30, 2024 limited to the same seven beaches as 2023: Jericho Beach, Trout Lake Beach (John Hendry Park), Kitsilano Beach, Locarno Beach, New Brighton Park Beach, Spanish Banks and Second Beach (Stanley Park).
