SUBJECT: 2025 Q2 Park Board Financial Update – Board Briefing Memo

The purpose of this memo is to provide the Commissioners with a high-level overview of the financial results for the second quarter of 2025, ending June 30, 2025.

Operating Results & Forecast

Park Board ended the second quarter of the year with a favourable budget variance of \$7.4M and is forecasting to end the 2025 fiscal year with a \$4.5M net budget surplus. The table below summarizes the June year-to-date operating results and forecast.

Operating Results

Park Board's year-to-date results at the end of June 2025 was favourable to budget by \$7.4M.

- Revenues higher than budget (+\$1.0M)
 - Higher than budget revenues in parking and commercial leases
 - Partially offset by lower revenues in recreation admissions and passes
- Expenditures lower than budget (+\$6.4M)
 - One-time current savings for delayed opening of Oakridge Community Centre (full budget included in 2025 budget)
 - One-time current year savings in Urban Forestry due to a fleet shortage, difficult to hire positions expect to partially reverse in second half of the year through the utilization of the Board approved efficient procurement of blended service model. Staff will seek the ability to carry forward unspent budget at the end of 2025 into 2026 to ensure backlog can continue to be addressed.
 - Timing savings in salaries and wages due to timing of TFT hires in park ops and timing of maintenance costs. These costs are expected to be spent by year end.



Full Year Forecast

Park Board is forecasting to end the year with a net budget surplus of \$4.5M.

- Revenues are expected to be higher than budget by \$1.1M mainly due higher parking and lease revenues; partially offset by lower than anticipated revenues in recreation admissions and passes, lower visitations at Van Dusen due to pricing pressures and SP train closure.
- Expenditures are expected to be favourable to budget by \$3.4M mainly due to one-time current year savings. With the exception of Stanley Park train, these costs are expected to be incurred in 2026.
 - o Delayed opening of Oakridge Community Centre
 - Urban Forestry fleet shortage and difficult to hire positions.
 - Maintenance on Stanley Park train

Capital Expenditures

As of June 30, 2025, Park Board spent \$20.8M or 48% of the total 2025 capital budget and is expecting to spend \$43.2M or 100% of the capital budget by year end. Project delivery continues to show positive results against plans, with no significant project delays expected.
